EXPONENTIAL TIMES

A YouTube video clip titled “Did You Know?” states that we are living in exponential times. The amount of people, technology, and information on this planet is multiplying so rapidly that it boggles the mind. For example:

- 25% of India’s population with the highest IQ’s is a greater number than the entire population of the USA. Translation: India has more honor students than the USA has students.
- The top 10 in-demand jobs for 2010 didn’t exist in 2004.
- There are five times more words in the English language now than there were during Shakespeare’s time.
- In 1984, there were 1000 internet devices. In 2008, there were 1,000,000,000.
- It is estimated that a week’s worth of New York Times newspapers contain more information than a person in the 18th century was exposed to in a lifetime.

The clip ends with the question “So what does it all mean?”¹

Good question – what *does* it all mean? And where does the Church fit into this equation?

Statistics such as these can overwhelm. Yet God is still in charge. The psalmist states, “From everlasting to everlasting you are God.” We need to remember that. The Body of Christ must always relate to the hurting world that surrounds us. Whatever medium we use to convey it, the Message is always the same – Christ died to reconcile lost people to Himself. He lives so we can live.

In places where believers have grasped that truth and joyfully shared it, the church is also growing exponentially – exploding as people see their lives changed through knowing Christ. No matter how much information or how much technology humankind develops, it can’t comprehend the impact of a redeemed life.
